

*The Library of Congress states this effort to educate the public about the issues related to disability and employment began in 1945, when Congress enacted Public Law 176, declaring the first week of October each year as National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week. In 1962, the word "physically" was removed to acknowledge the employment needs and contributions of individuals with all types of disabilities. Some 25 years later, Congress expanded the week to a month and changed the name to National Disability Employment Awareness Month.


The theme for 2023 National Disability Employment Awareness Month is "Advancing Access and Equity".

Recreation Corner



Important Dates for NJ Voters:

October 17: Voter registration deadline October 28: November 5: In person early voting

October 31: Final day to request mail in ballot by mail

November 6: Final day to request mail in ballot in-person

November 7: New Jersey General Election

Questions to ask when preparing to vote:

- Are you registered to vote?
- Do you need help to register to vote?
- Do you need to mail in your ballot?
- Do you need help to register to vote by mail?
- Is your polling station accessible? If not, why isn't it?
- Do you need assistance or training on how to vote?
- Do you need transportation to the polling station?

Our vote is our community's voice! It is important that we come out to vote so that our voices can be heard and our needs are addressed. If you need help with any of these issues or have other questions, please ask the DIAL staff. You still have time to register to vote.

Museums to Visit This Fall:



(3rd floor of Children's Library) Bloomfield, NJ

Paterson Great Falls National Historic Park is one of the newest additions to the national park service. The waterfall is 77 feet high and emerged approximately 13,000 years ago at the end of the ice age. In 1778 Alexander Hamilton realized the potential of water power for industrial development and he spearheaded the development of the nation's first planned industrial city. The best spot to begin your hike in the park is a bronze statue of Alexander Hamilton that stands right on the viewing platform that overlooks this impressive waterfall.



The Museum of the Historical Society of Bloomfield features many items depicting the history of Bloomfield and its neighboring communities including maps, posters, dioramas, memorabilia, newspapers, letters, postcards, deeds, documents, books, furniture, clothing and accessories, household articles, tools, paintings, and toys.

<u>History of The Paterson Museum</u> 2 Market St, Paterson, NJ 07501

The Paterson Museum was organized in 1925 by the City of Paterson Library's Board of Trustees. The Museum began it's operations in the assembly room of the Danforth Public Library with a display of natural history items that had been donated to the library by local residents.

Over the years, the Museum's collections grew in size and scope, and additional space was needed. This need was met in 1982 when the Museum was relocated into the restored Thomas Rogers Locomotive and Machine Shop (c. 1873) at the corner of Market Street and Spruce Street, in the heart of the Great Falls National Historic Landmark District. The nationally famous Great Falls of the Passaic, provides a unique backdrop for our exhibits.
